1. Dr. Shabbir Amanullah (Full Member, NS)

Dr. Amanullah began his higher specialist training in England and then moved to Prince Edward Island. He is now an active faculty member of Dalhousie University, in Nova Scotia. He is involved in clinical management, research and teaching; and his clinical care and commitment to service are exemplary. His affable demeanor aids in advancing his positive contributions, and makes him well liked by his colleagues. Dr. Amanullah has made very positive contributions to the Canadian Psychiatric Association and he is sure to be a positive influence on the CAGP Board.

2. Dr. Holly Dornan (Member-in-Training, ON)
